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About the artist

Niketa's artistic journey took a winding path before blossoming anew in 2016. After two decades exploring diverse fields, she rekindled her passion for art, earning her BFA from Kenyatta University in 2016, building upon her 1993 Diploma in Graphic Design. Her vibrant paintings and textile collages, executed in oil, acrylic, and watercolors, draw inspiration from a rich tapestry of personal memories, evocative environments, and pressing social issues. Since 2015, her work has graced numerous group exhibitions, both locally – at the UN Headquarters, the ISK affordable art show, and the National Museum affordable Art Show – and internationally, with showcases in Delhi, India, and Castellon, Spain.

Artists Statement

Art, for me, transcends mere decoration; it imbues life with meaning and serves as a bridge between diverse cultures. It acts as a catalyst for introspective conversations, stirring within us emotions that uplift, motivate, and challenge.

Through vibrant fabric collages and paintings, I commemorate the dynamic interplay between my urban and natural Kenyan environment. My work reflects my personal connection to Nairobi and Kenya, where questions of identity have often left me feeling like a transient outsider despite my Kenyan roots. These themes permeate my art, prompting dialogue about identity, belonging, environmental concerns, gender roles, water accessibility, and the plight of endangered wildlife.

The Water Bearers

This intimate series, composed of watercolors on 13cm x 17cm 130lb paper, delves into the everyday struggles of Kenyan women. Each piece features the ubiquitous yellow "mtungi," a symbol of their relentless quest for water, the lifeblood of their families.

The mtungi transcends its utilitarian purpose, becoming a powerful symbol of resilience and resourcefulness. Its presence across Sub-Saharan Africa speaks to its practicality and durability, a lifeline for countless communities.

Intricate border patterns, reminiscent of both Mughal miniatures and vibrant African fabrics, adorn these tiny canvases. They serve as a visual elevation, framing the women's stories and amplifying their worth. Through these details, the series acknowledges the invisible labor that sustains not just families, but entire communities.







Confronting Our Responsibility: A Call to Collective Action This exhibition dives deep into the crucial role of global conservation, urging viewers to actively examine their place within it. Climate crisis, ecosystem collapse, and growing social injustice aren't isolated issues; they're intimately intertwined. As we grasp the interdependency of human cultures and natural systems, a fresh urgency arises to abandon the exploitative habits and mindsets that have led us to this ecological precipice. Though the need for change has been long recognized, translating awareness into action remains a hurdle. Policy struggles to keep pace with scientific warnings, while our narratives and ways of relating to the natural world fail to offer alternative perspectives that could guide us towards sustainable solutions. This profound challenge demands a radical collective effort. No single discipline holds the key to overcoming a crisis as deeply rooted in cultural and spiritual values as it is in environmental factors. We must join forces, drawing on diverse perspectives and expertise, to weave a new tapestry of understanding and action.

The Work

My interest in human relationships with the local environment has led to my current body of work which explores themes of interconnectedness between the animal, human and natural world. Cultural symbolism from indigenous people, elements from the natural world, and the African Landscape are always present in my work. My style can be described as contemporary realism and can be seen on the 'Spirits' page in the attached portfolio.

As mentioned some of my new work is about layering fabrics to create new landscapes. I would like to continue the series of works that I have, 'Spirits' and share the result hopefully in an exhibition of 10 paintings in September 2025.

They are paintings of animals and people layered with other natural elements to convey a sense of deep connection between all of nature.

The idea that this connectedness between everything is sacred is what I am hoping to share with the world to remind everyone to be mindful when exploring both nature. Theme

Conservation is the central theme of this exhibit. This is an important topic for many of us; it is also far more complex than we realize. Human lives and livelihoods are at stake, as well as animal lives. To solve it we have to collaborate with humans at the grassroots level to embrace and appreciate their environment and its flora and fauna.
